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WHAT IS ADVENT?

The Advent season is a time for setting our gaze afresh on Jesus Christ, celebrating the hope, peace, joy, and love that he brings with his coming. Beginning four Sundays prior to Christmas and ending on Christmas Eve, Advent helps us prepare for the coming, or "advent" of the Christ child at Christmas.

For hundreds of years, Christians have used the Advent wreath as a visual example of a symbol that is borrowed from the emphasis throughout Scripture of Jesus Christ being the Light of the World (Matt. 4:16; John 1:4-9, 8:12). Each week, a new candle is lit, building up anticipation for Christmas Eve.
The last candle, called the Christ Candle, is lit on Christmas Eve to represent Jesus' first Advent. Through this theme of increasing light breaking into the darkness, we see a visual picture of the gospel. We are reminded about the meaning of Christ's birth and become more excited about his coming in the past, in the future, and in the present through each of our lives.

In an increasingly busy and frenzied world, Advent is an opportunity for believers to slow down and remember God's promise to send a Savior who would overcome sin and death forever; a promise fulfilled in Jesus Christ. As we set our gaze upon him, Christ becomes the substance of our hope, the source of our peace, the object of our joy, and enfolds us in the gift of his love.

Integration Sxplanation

Our hope is that this journal does not simply inspire you to dive into this Advent season nor just provide content that furthers your revelation.

Our greatest desire is to give you practical ways of integrating the themes of Advent into your personal discipleship and your community this season. We know every disciple of Jesus is at different levels of maturity and stages of development. What integration looks like for one may be completely different from another person. Because of this, we want to provide a framework for integrating this journal's content no matter where you are on that journey! Pastor Jacob has introduced our church to language that will be helpful in giving us steps for integration. We want to give you a definition of this framework so you know how to engage as you see this language throughout the journal.

Basic:

This is a great place to start if the content is completely new or something you have never incorporated into your discipleship journey before this journal. This is the first step!

Baseline:

This is for those who have begun the journey of integrating and want to grow and stretch themselves. This is a great way to try something new and incorporate new disciplines into your journey.

Build:

This is for those who have been working on the practical integration for a while and desire further growth. Not everyone will land on this step this Advent season, and that is completely okay!

Once again, we know that all of us are on a journey, and no two journeys look alike! Please do not let this framework discourage you if you do not hit every level this Advent. Our goal is simply to provide opportunities for integration and for each of us to take one step towards being more transformed by Jesus!



HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

This guide will lead you on a journey through the 4 weeks of Advent beginning on the fourth Sunday before Christmas, ending on December 24th, the 12 days of Christmas (Dec 25th – Jan 5th), and finally, the day of Epiphany (Jan 6th). As we look at various parts of the narrative of Jesus' birth, we will focus on the hope, peace, joy, and love we have in the coming Christ.

The story begins in the Garden with God's promise of a Savior and ends with eager anticipation of Jesus' promised return. We see the hope of all creation rest on Gabriel's message to Mary, that she will bear the Savior of the world. We see God's glorious declaration of peace on earth through the heavenly hosts' appearance to the lowly shepherds. We see the joy of the coming Christ in the meeting of Mary and Elizabeth. We see the demonstration of God's amazing love and desire for all nations to come and worship His Son through Simeon's moment of consolation.

Even if you know the Advent narrative well, don't rush past what God has for you in this season. For many, this may be the first time to consider all that God is saying through the birth of His Son. For others, it will be an opportunity to rediscover the way God intimately works in the details of life for His glory and the good of man. For all of us, may this season be one marked by hope, expectation, remembrance, and worship. The King has come and is coming! There is much to celebrate.

Advent is an opportunity to pause and reflect on the birth of Jesus. But especially for families, this time of year can be filled to the brim with activities and obligations. Before the calendar begins to overflow, set aside time to consider what you want this season to be for your family. Then, make a plan so that a time intended to remember and celebrate Jesus doesn't get swallowed up by lesser things.

Weekly Juerview

Before diving into the content, we wanted to provide an overview of what you can expect for each week. Advent is broken down into four themes: Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. We will focus on one theme each week and have provided you with several ways of engaging with the weekly theme!

THEME EXPLANATION

We will use these pages to give you further content and an explanation of each week's theme. Our hope is this sparks revelation in your heart and serves as a starting place for further study.

THEME INTEGRATION

These pages are where you will see our integration language: Basic, Baseline, and Build. We have offered suggestions for integrating the weekly theme into your personal discipleship journey and fun suggestions for interacting with community this season.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

We know abiding in God's Word is how we bear fruit and a vital part of discipleship. On these pages, you will find daily scripture readings to help you dive deeper into the story of Christ.

JOURNAL REFLECTIONS

This is an opportunity to reflect and journal on how you took one step toward personal integration this week. Reflection is a vital part of learning from our integration practices. We have provided a few journaling prompts to help you reflect on your integration for the week.







Week One: Hope

The story of Advent begins in the beginning. In the Garden of Eden, we see that God speaks a beautiful world into being, creates humanity in His image, and then blesses and gives humanity dominion over the earth. There in the garden, God and His image bearers walk together in the cool of the day, and it is good. It's the reality every human being was made for. But lo and behold, not even 4 chapters into the story, a deceitful serpent, an apple, and a wretched conversation later, all of creation is plunged into darkness, sin, and death. Man is separated from God, but God has a plan.

In Luke 1:26-35 (ESV), when the angel Gabriel reveals to Mary that she will supernaturally become pregnant with the Messiah, he says to her, "And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. And the Lord God will give to him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." When Gabriel speaks the name of the promised child, he gives substance to the hope of all of mankind. Jesus literally means salvation or savior, rescuer, and deliver. Messiah will reign over an unending Kingdom in which all that was lost to darkness in that garden will be salvaged, rescued, and delivered once and for all. What Mary must have felt in that moment for her people, for herself?

Have you ever experienced the thrill of hope? When all seemed lost, there in the darkness, a light appears. Jesus Christ is our hope of hopes. We look to his coming: past, present, and future, and as we allow him to daily come stunningly into view, we let our hope arise and rest in him alone. That he came as a child, that we who receive and grow up in him might be called the children of God, is reason to expect every awaited promise will be kept. In a world consumed with hopelessness as dark as night, Jesus shines like the dawn. It is in His advent that we find the hope of the nations. Gabriel speaks these powerful words to Mary in Luke 1:37. May they resonate with us this Advent season, *"For nothing will be impossible with God."*

JESUS IS OUR HOPE

There are too many people who live hopelessly. Hopelessness is a blindness to the Love of God. We get to partner with God in helping those who feel unseen or unloved to recognize they are seen and loved by Him. We get to offer Hope to our community.

Week 1 | Hope | Integration

Basic:

Give to an organization that helps people. Give something or an amount of money of your choosing to a local organization that helps families. This will start to tune your heart toward Jesus and His heart for those hurting.

Read through Psalm 42 one time this week.

Baseline:

Help meet a basic need for an individual or a family. Finding out who has a need may be a little foreign to some. If you look at who is usually helping others meet basic needs, they will be able to help you getconnected to a need that you are able to meet. This is why community is important.

Read and meditate on Psalm 42 throughout this week.

Build:

Be a champion of Hope. Start being someone who is identifying people in need and being a champion for that individual or family. You will be the person posting about needs so that others can help meet that need. Don't try to do it alone!

Commit to reading through Psalm 42 daily with your Life Group this week.

Week Two: Deace

In the Garden of Eden, we see the heartbreaking separation of God and man, but in a field of shepherds, heaven reintroduces itself in a big way. On the outskirts of the town of Bethlehem, shepherds are keeping watch of their flocks by night when the heavens burst forth in the sky overhead. An angel speaks, and a heavenly host erupts in praise for the Advent of Christ. Can you imagine? You're quietly tending to a work you've done night after night for years when heaven interrupts on a grand scale. Scripture says that the shepherds were filled with great fear. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"-Luke 2:14

Peace is the great reintroduction, the great interruption! Heaven invades Earth with a declaration of peace and goodwill while Jesus is yet a baby in a manger. The word of promise is made flesh, and his coming has already initiated the reconciliation of heaven and Earth. It is the reconciliation for which God has longed for generations. Since the time Adam and Eve sinned in the garden and hid at the sound of His coming, God has waited for millennia to declare "peace!" He declares it in the coming of His Son.

Like the angelic arrival among the shepherds that night, God's peace often arrives like an interruption. It is an interruption to any fallen thought patterns, habits, or expectations. Peace is an interruption to our propensity to fear. Christ's Advent is a declaration of peace to our fears and a promise that God wills to work all things together for our good. After generations of separation, this is heaven's first message to mankind, and it is God's daily invitation to us to receive His peace, His will, and His pleasure in us. Arriving at the place of his birth, the shepherds worship the Christ child and share the account of their heavenly interruption with Mary. Scripture says,

And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. May we, too, treasure up the promises of God, pondering them in our hearts this Advent season.

For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. -Isaiah 9:6

> O come, Desire of nations, bind In one the hearts of all mankind; Bid Thou our sad divisions cease, And be Thyself our King of Peace. -O Come, O Come, Emmanuel

JESUS IS THE PRINCE OF PEACE

He has empowered us to live in peace. Peace is both a gift and a fruit of the Spirit. Jesus has provided peace for us, but it's up to us to cultivate an environment of peace and be persons of peace.

Week 2 | Peace | Integration

Basic:

Each night, speak the Lord's blessing over your household. Mark 12:30-31 ESV Love the Lord with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength. Love your neighbor as yourself. Numbers 6:24-26 ESV The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine on upon you and be gracious to you; the Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace.

Spend 5 minutes in silence as many days as you can this week.

Baseline:

Do things that will make your home a peaceful home. Start one habit of resetting your home at night.

> Examples: Lay clothes out at night so you aren't rushing in the morning. Get rid of the clutter in that corner you've been ignoring for a year.


Spend 15 minutes in silence and prayer each day this week.

Build:

Bring peace wherever you may go.

Reflect on your responses toward others or situations when you have been wronged or inconvenienced. Did that disturb your peace? Do you join every debate and argument on social media? Do you allow other co-workers to speak in a dishonorable way about your supervisor in your presence? Crazy enough, peace can be disruptive to a non-peaceful culture. Offer peace in every situation. *"A gentle answer turns away wrath"—* not just of the person you're responding to, but your wrath, too!

Begin the discipline of daily spending 30 minutes in silence and prayer.

Week Three: Joy

Months before angels appear to the shepherds in Bethlehem, Mary, having received the news from the angel Gabriel that she is to conceive the Messiah, visits her cousin Elizabeth. Elizabeth herself is with child, carrying John in her old age, the one who will prepare the way of the Lord. Scripture tells us, *In those days Mary arose and went with haste into the hill country, to a town in Judah, and she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. And when Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the baby leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit, and she exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb! And why is this granted to me that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For behold, when the sound of your greeting came to my ears, the baby in my womb leaped for joy.* -Luke 1:39-44

Mary has told little to no one of the promise that she carries. She has pondered the angel's words quietly to herself. No one yet sees the evidence of the child growing within her, and it is in this greeting between her and Elizabeth we are met with the joyous confirmation Mary must have been longing for. Elizabeth's unborn son recognizes the presence of the Messiah. In this moment, Elizabeth's baby leaps within her, and she is filled with the Holy Spirit. The arrival of the King does that! It is his presence in our lives that causes the life within us to leap. When Elizabeth is filled with the Holy Spirit, she immediately begins to speak words of thanksgiving and praise. The Advent season is pregnant with joy. As we acknowledge the coming of Christ in our lives and in the lives of those around us, past, present, and future, we must celebrate it. Mary's situation seemed impossible, and Elizabeth's situation was called barren, yet in the presence of the Savior, by the handiwork of God, life and joy! This is the promise of God to all of creation. Where impossibility and barrenness have reigned, a new reign has come. Like Elizabeth, may words of thanksgiving and praise erupt from our hearts. As we do this, his joy is released in our lives for ourselves and for others. May we prepare a way for the Lord in our lives, celebrating the past and present, and expecting to celebrate the future.

JESUS IS OUR JOY

Joy seems to be a difficult thing for people to achieve. What if we told you that it's not just an emotional destination but a daily choice of remembrance and hope for the future, fueled by a heart of gratitude? During Advent, we remember the joy the shepherds in the field had when they learned of the Messiah's birth. All of Heaven rejoiced in front of the shepherds! What an amazing sight that would have been! When we choose to trust that God will never forsake us and He has only good for us forever, we can't help but have joy in anticipation for Jesus's second coming!

Week 3 | Joy | Integration

Basic:

Train your soul for gratitude. Start a routine of thanking God for something in the morning when you wake up or at night before bed

Find one person to celebrate this week in a small way.

Baseline:

Offer joy to someone else. So many times, we forget to be specific in our thanks to others. When you decide to put thoughtfulness behind an encouraging word instead of something generic and "safe" that everyone else uses.

Find two to three people to celebrate this week.

Build:

Plan a party! Celebrating others will help you live a life of joy! It's Christmas time— you can plan a party to celebrate Jesus and the joy He has brought to your life.

Look for ways to daily celebrate the people you encounter.

Week Four: Love

After Jesus is born, Mary and Joseph take him to the Temple to present him to the Lord and to offer sacrifices according to the law. It is there they encounter Simeon. The story of Simeon beautifully ties many Advent themes together. Just like Israel, God's covenant people, had been waiting and hoping for the Messiah, and all of humanity had been waiting for the Savior, Simeon is looking, waiting, and hoping for the consolation of Israel, the One who would come and save Israel. He waited many years, hoping he would see it with his own eyes. The Holy Spirit even promised him that he would.

Then, one day, somehow, he sensed the Spirit leading him to the Temple to see what he had waiting so long to see. He sees this young couple carrying a tiny baby and knows that He is the One. He picks up the little One in his arms and brings all the prophetic promise into one moment, *"a light for the nations."* He had waited and hoped; he had prepared for the moment God's promise would be fulfilled for him, and this was the moment. Hope, joy, and peace culminated in the Child. He had received the gift of God's perfect love.

For many of us, Christmas Day is one of the most important days of the entire year. We adjust schedules, plans, and budgets months in advance. Family members travel in from far away. Decorations are perfectly placed, menus are planned, and gifts wrapped. There is intentionality, joy, and anticipation, all because this day is significant. And also, because we believe it is a reality. Christmas isn't a pretend day; it's real. We trust it to come on the same date every year. Out of love and expectation, we make every necessary preparation, so that when it comes, we are ready. We spend months preparing to celebrate and remember Christ's first coming. How much more should we seek to be ready for His second coming? That day, too, is a reality;an absolute certainty. Unlike Christmas Day, which happens every December 25, only the Father knows the day and hour His Son will return. But He is coming. How, then, are we to prepare, and how shall we wait?

We wait in love. As we receive the gift of the love of Christ, we allow him to transform us into his same likeness, extending his love to all we encounter. This is the daily Advent of Christ in us each day. That his love would be made manifest in every one of his children and given lavishly away is the heart's desire of the Father who made us for himself.

JESUS IS LOVE

Love is a multifaceted word, yet there is only One who holds all facets perfectly. When we are in the season of observing Advent before Christmas, we are remembering the anticipation of the Messiah's coming, and we celebrate His birth. Without His birth, there would be no death or resurrection. We are in an advent awaiting His return right now. *"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son..."* It was Love that brought Jesus to us. It was Love that kept Him on the cross. It was Love that brought Him back to life. It is Love that will power His return.

How do we give of ourselves as Jesus gave Himself?

What does love look like? These are not to be taken as the only steps you can take, but simple suggestions if you are having a hard time getting started.

Week 4 | Love | Integration

Basic:

Love through your prayer. Pray for the leaders of organizations that are helping those in need. That certainly includes the churches in your community.

Read 1 John 4:7-12 this week.

Baseline:

Love through serving. Give some of your time and skills to a local organization

Read and meditate on 1 John 4:7-12 each day this week.

Build:

Be consistent in your love. Sign up to give and serve regularly.

Memorize and meditate on 1 John 4:7-12 this week.




